... As the gardening season

comes to a close, it is a time of celebration and reflection. In the garden as in life, rejoice in your successes and learn from the miscues as we look forward to the coming seasons bright with promise.

November is the time to:

- * Rake the leaves off the lawn and add to the compost pile
- * To protect strawberries, loosely apply a layer of straw or Mainly Mulch around the crowns
- * Plant amaryllis for holiday display
- * Continue planting tulips and daffodils

How to: Prepare your chickens for the winter

*Make sure coop is pest free and predator safe. Check that the coop and fencing are secure. Try Night Guard Predator protectors. * Provide ventilation without drafts

* Use straw or pine shavings for bedding. Remove and replace damp bedding

* Supply feed and water. Heated waterers are available

* Store feed in tight receptacles

* Supplement with protein treats (Happy Hen) to give your birds the ability to generate heat during cold spells. Add scratch

grains too.

* To ensure egg production provide lighting in the early morning hours to give your hens a total of 14-16 hours of sunlight.



Earth Friendly Choices:

December is the time to:

* Monitor house plants for insects with yellow sticky traps. Spray as needed with insecticidal soap.

* Spray evergreens and broadleaf evergreens with Wilt Pruf

* Prune holly and evergreens to make holiday wreaths and tabletop displays

* Set up a birdbath heater

Garden FAQs: Invasion of the ladybugs

While welcome in the spring to rid our gardens of aphids, this is the time of year when ladybugs congregate to hibernate. Attracted to lightly colored homes they are usually found on the south western side of the house because of the heat the house reflects.

Ladybugs release phoromones to attract other ladybugs from as far away as ¹/₄ mile. To keep them from entering your home caulk small openings & crevices. Unlike most household pests, ladybugs pose no danger to clothes or food stuffs. But take caution, they emit a noxious odor and stain if squished.

Damage Control

For lawns and plantings effected by the recent storm surge, Cornell Copperative Extension recommends leaching the area with fresh water to mitigate the damage due to excessive salt.

Island wide evergreen foliage was hard hit by wind and salt spray. Hose down plants to eliminate salt deposits. Erect and/or wrap plants with burlap protective barriers.

Talmage Tip

Sanitation plays a large part in insect and disease prevention in the garden. Clean up and destroy fallen and mummified fruit and foliage that had fungal diseases this past season.

Garden Project: Natural Ornaments

Deck the halls, Christmas trees and wreaths with these made from nature garden ornaments. Collect seed pods (milkweed), pinecones and leaves from the woods or garden. Gild with gold or silver
